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John of the Cross, in his book *The Living Flame of Love*, compares our pre-Advent selves to green logs that have been thrown into a fire, the fire of love. In carrying tension, we come to kindling temperature and are made ready for love....

The sublime has to be waited for. Only when there is first enough heat will there be unity. To give birth to what's divine requires the slow patience of gestation. In shorthand, that's the algebra of Advent.

Introduction

“PEACE BE WITH YOU.” These are Bishop Fulton J. Sheen’s familiar opening words to many of his television and radio broadcasts. For Bishop Sheen, the concept of inner peace was a central one to his approach to spreading God’s Word. The following quotation sums up Bishop Sheen’s message about peace:

Inner peace can be won only by making God the ruler of *all* that we do. Many people who believe in God refuse to go this far: they keep Him in a small compartment of their minds. Their plans are laid without consulting Him; their trials and sufferings are endured...and their days are passed in loneliness and weariness, although each hour might have been filled with sweetness.

To such hearts a single moment of grace may work the change. They suddenly become aware that “the Lord is in the house.” Better still, the Lord is in our hearts. They are no longer self-centered, now, but they are God-centered; outer events of their lives can no longer ruffle their peace.

This concern for the salvation of the individual—the possession of the true peace of Christ—is a theme that runs through Bishop Sheen’s entire ministry from his boyhood in Peoria, Illinois, to his days as a student for the priesthood, to his theological

training at the University of Louvain in Belgium and to his work as a widely loved radio and TV personality.

True to Sheen's vision, this companion through Advent and Christmas can be seen as a personal journey of transformation from the self-centered to the God-centered, from green logs to kindling, from outer chaos to inner peace—the same peace witnessed to by the angels of Bethlehem.



How to Use This Book

ADVENT—that period of great anticipatory joy—is a time of preparation for the celebration of Christ’s arrival in Bethlehem as a helpless infant. In the Western liturgy, Advent begins four Sundays prior to December 25—the Sunday closest to November 30 which is the feast of Saint Andrew, one of Jesus’ first disciples. The annual commemoration of Christ’s birth begins the Christmas cycle of the liturgical year—a cycle which runs from Christmas Eve to the Sunday after the feast of the Epiphany. In keeping with the unfolding of the message of the liturgical year, this book is designed to be used during the entire period from the first Sunday of Advent to the end of the Christmas cycle. The four weeks of Advent are often thought of as symbolizing the four different ways that Christ comes into the world: (1) at his birth as a helpless infant at Bethlehem; (2) at his arrival in the hearts of believers; (3) at his death; and (4) at his arrival on Judgment Day.

Because Christmas falls on a different day of the week each year, the fourth week of Advent is never really finished; it is abruptly, joyously, and solemnly abrogated by the annual coming again of Christ at Christmas. Christ’s Second Coming will also one day abruptly interrupt our sojourn here on earth.

Since the calendar dictates the number of days in Advent, this book includes Scripture and meditation readings for a full twenty-eight days. These twenty-eight daily readings make up Part I of this book. It is suggested that the reader begin at the

beginning and then on Christmas Day switch to Part II, which contains materials for the twelve days of Christmas. If there are any “extra” entries from Part I, these may be read by doubling up days, if so desired, or by reading two entries on weekends. Alternately, one may just skip those entries that do not fit within the Advent time frame for that particular year.

Part III of this book proposes two optional formats for using each daily entry as part of a longer liturgical observance similar to Night Prayer combined with a version of the Office of Readings. These options are for those who may wish to use this book as part of a more-developed individual or group observance.

The purpose of these readings is to enrich the Advent/Christmas/Epiphany season of the liturgical year and set up a means by which individuals, families, or groups may observe the true meaning of the season.

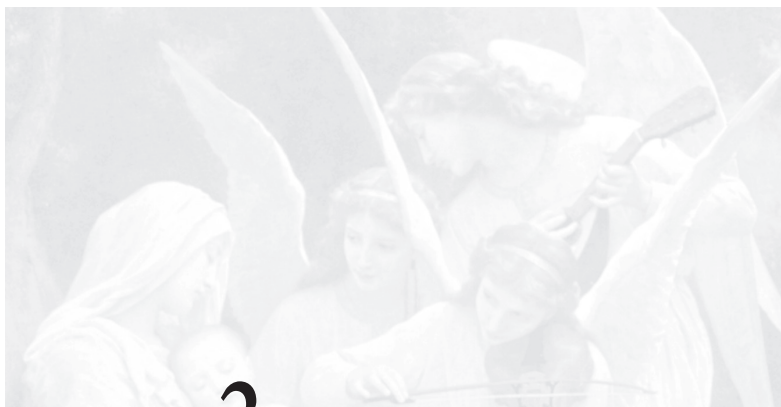

Two Births, Two Bethlehems

Death Before Life

Gifts and Justice

You might say that it was very unjust of God to deprive us of friendship with him, and of these other gifts, simply because Adam sinned. There would have been injustice if God deprived you of your due, but you are no more entitled to be a child of God than a razor has a right to bloom, or a rose has the right to bark, or a dog has the right to quote Dante. What Adam lost was gifts, not a heritage.

On Christmas Day, when you distribute gifts to your friends, would I have a right to say to you: “Why do you not give me a gift?” You would answer: “I am not doing you an injustice, because I owe you nothing. I am not obliged to give these gifts to my friends. If I had not given them gifts, I would not have deprived them of anything I owed them.” So, neither did God owe us anything beyond our nature as a creature of his handiwork.



PREFACE TO RELIGION

Lord, as I gather my offerings in thanksgiving for the gift of your Beloved Son, let me remember the needs of those for whom my gifts are an obligatory duty, not an act of mere generosity.
